Last month we featured writings from a nine-year-old girl who has been battling cancer over half her life and a 23-year-old young man who has been cancer-free for seven years. This month we'd like you to meet Stella and Georgia, two exceptional young women.

When Stella was four years old she was diagnosed with a very rare form of cancer called acute megakaryoblastic leukemia, or AMKL. Her family took her to St. Jude's where doctors and researchers have been improving survival rates for children with leukemia since 1962. Last year Stella had a bone marrow transplant and it has been so successful that she was able to attend school this past year (well, most of it). This nearly eight-year-old little girl loves to read, play outside, and eat Cracker Barrel chicken pot pie. Here's her poem with a surprisepunchline.

An Unexpected Gift

Georgia Cowie was one of our two scholarship winners this year. We introduced this amazing young woman to you on page three of our June issue. We reached out to Georgia to write something for us, and she penned this beautiful and timely tribute to medical personnel.

I didn't know it at the time, but surviving cancer was the best thing to ever happen to me. Without cancer, I would have never discovered my passion for nursing. Having spent three weeks in the Johns Hopkins pediatric intensive care unit for a heart transplant in 2016, and 10 weeks inpatient on the oncology unit the following year, I saw first-hand nursing at its best. The care, compassion, and empathy shown to me helped me survive. Sharing every pivotal and painful moment with my nurses made me want to be what they were for me.

Aside from discovering my calling, I made lifelong friends. My favorite oncology nurse became my neighbor and we see each other often. The attending physician of the PICU when my heart transplant was performed is like family. She and my heart surgeon moved to Chicago to work at Advocate Children's Hospital in Chicago and they invited me out to work with them last October. It was surreal to see my surgeon perform an open-heart surgery on another kid while he had a normal conversation with me. I also got to shadow nurses and even talk to the kids that I just watched have surgery. The relationship you share with the doctors and nurses during a hospital stay is so powerful. They see you at your very worst but continue to encourage and care for you.

I remember seeing a little girl walk the halls of the oncology unit with her shaved head and bright smile. I asked my nurse after I was discharged how she was doing, and she told me she didn't make it. It wasn't until that moment that I realized how close to death I really was. Something about being stripped of your comfort, energy, and spirit brings you so much clarity. The gratitude you feel for everyone and everything after nearing death is unexplainable. Without cancer and without my heart transplant, I would have never uncovered my calling, built lifelong friendships, and realized how precious life truly is.

Some Sobering Facts About the Pandemic

We're not out of the Covid-19 woods yet, and we may not be for quite some time. Dr. Michael Osterholm, PhD, MPH, who is an internationally known expert in infectious disease epidemiology and author of a book published in 2017 titled "Deadliest Enemy," which correctly foretold a global pandemic, offers some excellent information and insight. (Following are direct quotes from an interview with Dan Beuttner published last month on bluezones.com.)

- Three months ago, Covid-19 was not even in the top 75 causes of death in this country.
 Much of the last month, it was the number one cause of death. This is more remarkable than the 1918 flu pandemic.
- There is no scientific indication Covid-19 will disappear of its own accord. There is nothing in our past history that would suggest the virus will just suddenly disappear and die off. While it does change genetically over time, it's still a very stable virus. There's no evidence that somehow it might just mutate itself away. That's just not going to happen.
- If you're under age 55, obesity is the #1 risk factor. So eating the right diet, getting physical activity, and managing stress are some of the most important things you can do to protect yourself from the disease.
- One of the best things we can do for our aging parents is to get them out into the fresh air, while maintaining physical (not social) distancing. It turns out that being in the outside environment dissipates the aerosols that spread the virus. The challenge is attending indoor family or social events because we put out hundreds of thousands of aerosols every minute when we talk. For example, if you're riding in a car with someone who's infected, you may become infected by breathing their air within 10 minutes. If they have a cloth mask on, that may move it to 20, but it doesn't eliminate it.
- Wearing a cloth mask does not protect you much if you're in close contact with someone who is Covid-19 contagious. It may give you 10 minutes, instead of five, to avoid contracting the disease.
- Only 5% of the country has been infected to date. We can expect Covid-19 to infect 60-70% of Americans (around 200 million Americans) until we achieve 'herd immunity,' where these people are immune rods in the transmission reaction. I call it the leaky bucket virus because if there's one little crack somewhere, it will get out and will infect people.
- We can expect between 800,000 and 1.6 million Americans to die in the next 18 months if we don't have a successful vaccine. We have the world's top scientists working on this and there are over 120 vaccine candidates being evaluated right now. But there are challenges with coronaviruses. We know that from two other coronavirus infections called SARS and MERS; in both instances we were not able to get easily and effectively applied vaccines. Moreover, there are eight billion people in the world that want this vaccine right now.
- There is no guarantee of an effective vaccination and even if we can find one, it may only give short-term protection, which means people will have to keep getting revaccinated.
- Speeding a vaccine carries its own risks.
- Right now if you're over 65, you're male, if you have underlying heart disease, hypertension, diabetes, renal disease, certain lung cancers or blood cancers or if you're moderately to severely obese, then these are all risk factors for developing the disease.


